1.Implementing the student's feedback on the curriculum: The feedback from students are collected at the end of each year and collated for further deliberations and actions. Based on the insights obtained the departments were informed to plan for the revision in curriculum and policy decisions required in order to fulfill various requirements of students on their teaching learning experience in the college 2. Organise a conference/seminar/ lecture series: One of the best practices in our college is to organize regular conferences / seminars / special lecture series on social, environmental causes, scientific brainstorming sessions .: IQAC and Department of Food Science and Nutrition (FSN) coorganizes several activities Health, Food and Nutrition related issues as well. It has been a regular practice to organize 1 day symposium on World Food Day (WFD) on 16th October every year with debates, discussions and dissemination of ideas and steps to make world free of Hunger. In 2016 WFD theme was Climate is Changing: Food and Agriculture Must Too. A symposium on this theme was organized in the college and several stalwarts in the area inspired the students and general public how we need to adapt to changing climatic conditions with change in agricultural practice and food habits. The college also organized a two day National conference on Food Based Approaches for Translational Nutrition. Luminaries and experts in the area with brilliant oratory skills motivated the students to take up food based approaches to solve all health and environment related problems. Further, were also impressed upon how our actions matters in achieving Zero hunger by 2030 in a daylong scientific seminars. Several workshops are also regularly organized on communicative English, quality culture, aptitude tests, communication skills to make students interview and future ready 3. Discussion Classess: Some departments of the college conduct discussion classes every saturday from 2.30 pm to 5.30 pm. These discussion classes provide a platform to the UG and PG students to gain indepth knowledge on various topics. The students are given topics on which they make a presentation. These classes aim at creating an interest among the students to go for higher studies at institutes of repute. Discussion classes help the students to prepare and write the summer research projects, and to train the students to write the common entrance examinations like JAM, JEST, KSET, NET, GATE, KVPY, CET for PG courses etc. 4. Yureka Science Fest: Yureka Science Fest is being organised every year during the even semester. This fest mainly focuses on propagation of Science,

along with art and literary events. Every year students come up with innovative ideas to make YUREKA a huge success amongst the student fraternity attracting more than 2000 students from in and around Mysore. This fest brings to the fore the organisational skills among the students and instills in them a feeling of togetherness and camaraderie which is very important to have a positive orientation in life. 5. Orientation Programme: In the beginning of every academic year, the college under aegis of IQAC and the Career Guidance and Placement Cell, organises a twoday Orientation Programme to welcome the new entrants to our college. The new students are made aware about all the rules and regulation, dos and donts and also they are made familiar with the rich legacy of the college. They are informed about the curriculum and the examination procedure. One of the best practices of our college is to organize a workshop on Gender Sensitization during the twoday orientation programme. To fulfil this, college council meeting has been arranged in each semester that includes all the HOD's and senior faculty members of the college under the leadership of the Principal of the college. The budget allocation has been made to all the departments as per their requirements for the maintenance of the laboratories and the classrooms

which is a part of the teaching and the learning processes. Prior to this, requirements should be finalized and approved by each department through departmental council meeting under the leadership of HOD. Accordingly, the budget is allocated in the college council. In addition to this, regular meetings of various committees constituted at the college level has been arranged for the purpose of utilizing physical, academic and support facilities and using the grants received by the college as per the requirements. The maintenance of the classrooms and the laboratories are done with the efforts of the D-group employees of nonteaching staff and contract staff appointed by the. The college garden is maintained by the gardener appointed by the college. Computers: The college has adequate number of the computers with internet connections and the utility software's distributed in different locales such as office, laboratories, library, departments etc. This has been maintained by Lab technicians who is appointed by the college. All HOD's submit their requirements to the Principal, regarding classroom furniture maintenance and other facilities. The college development fund is utilized for maintenance and minor repair of furniture and other electrical equipment in a regular specific budget allocation. Sports complex: An Physical Instructor has been appointed for the college to take care of the sports facilities and sports support. Students are trained to participate in University level, state level and national level events and extend the financial support for out standing students in terms of scholarships, travel, track suit etc. The co-curricular and extracurricular activities are carried out by Jnanavahini sangha of the college. 5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The college follows the policy of decentralization by delegating powers to staff members, both teaching Non teaching and involving students and their parents. The Governing Body, Academic Council, Board of Studies Finance Committee are the statuary bodies formulated to ensure the proper functioning of the academic, financial and general administrative affairs of the college. Governing Council (GC) oversees the administration of the college through various subcommittees and involving all the stake holders' viz., teaching and non teaching members as well as students. The Governing Council enforces high standards of integrity keeping the overall development of the college. The Academic Council (AC) represented by the Heads of the Department recommends to the GC for new program of study. The proposal to start new courses is being done after consultation with the experts, Parents, stake holders and other members exploring the industrial demand. The Board of Studies (BOS) in each department consists of senior faculty members and representatives from technical as well as industrial sectors in addition to alumnus of the college. The tasks of BOS include preparation of syllabi, suggest methods for innovative teaching evolution, thus coordinating teaching, research and other academic activities in the department / college. In addition to the above mentioned bodies, to further decentralize the power vested with the administrative bodies, the Principal of the college has been empowered to constitute various nonstatutory committees viz., Purchase committee , Grievance appeal committee , Disciplinary committee/ students welfare committee, Web committee, Career guidance and placement cell , Library committee , Yuvachinthana committee , Jnanavahini committee / extracurricular extension committee , Women empowerment committee, Sports committee, NSS committee, Admission committee, Free canteen committee, Planning evaluation committee, Green audit committee, Sexual harassment committee / internal complaints committee , Anti - ragging committee These committees are represented by the faculty members, non teaching staff, research scholars and students thus providing them the much needed flexibility and the power to plan and execute both curricular and noncurricular activities including sports, cultural activities and science exhibitions. Decentralization aiming at much needed autonomy at department level is achieved through Teachers Council wherein all the teachers of the department are the members of the Teachers Council. Teacher Council meetings are held periodically to seek the opinion of the teachers in the academic matters for the betterment of the academic excellence. All the faculty members are involved in one or the other committees in various administrative, academic and nonstatutory

committees and suggestions are sought for the betterment of the policies. Each department has department council where all teaching faculty of the department are the members. Execution of any major activities of the college and every activity of the department is discussed in the department council. Then decision evolved here is conveyed to the college through the head of the department.
