Physical facilities: The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of available financial resources collected from Partially Self Financial fund collected from the students at the time of admission and other CPE and Autonomy grants for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities in the interest of students. Classrooms are maintained according to their requirements to the Principal regarding classroom furniture and other facilities. The college development fund is utilized for maintenance and repair of furniture and other electrical equipments. Regular budget is provided for this purpose. **Sports complex:** A Physical Instructor is appointed for who takes care of the sports facilities and sports support.
