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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Founded in 1928, Yuvaraja's College is recognized for its academic standing as a leading science college and its vibrant research activities. Dedicated to excellence in education with social justice, the college is at the forefront in imparting top-quality higher education combined with pertinent skills in the fields of science and management studies. Its goal is to inspire students to learn, lead and excel in diverse areas to be tomorrow's innovators and leaders in a globalized world. With its strong social commitment it extends the benefits of higher education to students from economically backward and marginalized sections.

In the year 1928 the institution was initiated as an Intermediate college by His Highness Sri Krishnaraja Wodeyar, the erstwhile King of Mysore and was upgraded to a First Grade College in 1948. The college had the unique honour of having Prince Jayachamarajendra Wodeyar as its distinguished alumnus when he was admitted into the Junior Intermediate class in 1934. It was in honour of the prince that the college got the name Yuvaraja's College in 1954.

With the necessary infrastructure and qualified faculty members, the contribution of the college to national goals is in the pursuit, dissemination and application of knowledge through research, teaching, and extension activities. The college offers Graduate and Postgraduate courses and provides research opportunities in diverse areas. Currently, the college offers various academic programmes leading to B.Sc, BBA, BCA, M.Sc., MBA, and PhD degrees. During the last five years the college published 977 research papers. The college has also produced 64 PhDs in the last five years. Currently there are 44 research guides and 129 research scholars working for their PhD degrees.

Over the years the college has strived incessantly to maintain academic excellence. The University Grants Commission conferred autonomous status on the college in the year 2005. The institution was conferred the status of *College with Potential for Excellence* in 2010. In 2015 the college was conferred 'A' Grade by NAAC with CGPA 3.34 on the 4 point scale.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- Yuvaraja's College is centrally located on a 6.83 acre campus in Mysuru, a city that represents a rich cultural heritage.
- Lush green, clean sprawling campus which provides a vibrant learning environment.
- The college is nearing its century mark in 2028.
- An autonomous college with coeducation.
- A college completed the third cycle of accreditation with A Grade.
- Highly qualified teaching faculty who effectively teach and facilitate learning on a range of subjects and who also supervise research projects/dissertations and research leading to PhD degrees.
- Access and affordability in admission for student-learners from the marginalized sections of the society.
- Empowers rural girl students.
- Teaching faculty who engage in individual research and collaborate both internally and externally on research projects. The college has 43 PhD holders and 36 research supervisors among the UGC-faculty in the current academic year. There are 129 research scholars working for their Ph.D degrees.

- The teaching faculty contribute to the continuing review and development of subject delivery, introducing innovative modes of study, creating novel learning environments, and pedagogic practices.
- Research publications: 913 from 2017-2022.
- Ph.D degrees awarded in the last five years is 64.
- 6 MOUs signed with various institutions.
- SC/ST students receive government scholarships every year.
- For learning as well as teaching purpose SWAYAM and MOOCs are made use of by some faculty members.
- Accelerated digital transformation due to Covid-19 has resulted in a moderate percentage of selfdirected and motivated learners.
- Free canteen for the underprivileged students.
- A well-equipped health centre on the campus which provides free medical care to students and staff.

Institutional Weakness

- Delay in the appointment of teaching faculty by the parent university has put a great stress on the faculty.
- Absence of a dedicated research centre, limited research fund and research facilities.
- Potential talent of research not adequately tapped and converted into patents and copyrights.
- Increasing infrastructural facilities a challenge due to the heritage building.
- Need for a Central instrument facility.

Institutional Opportunity

- The college offers vibrant programmes in many fields of science to a diversity of students especially from the underprivileged and marginalized sections of the society.
- Adapting NEP System in all UG courses.
- A wide range of open electives offered to students.
- The college library has a robust internet system that provides e-resources in all disciplines which offers boundless opportunities to students as well as research scholars.
- Many departments tie up with centrally funded institutions and R&D organizations CFTRI, DFRL CSR&TI, ASI as they are in close proximity to the college.
- Vibrant NSS and NCC units of the college provide limitless opportunities to the students to serve the nation.
- Career guidance provided to students by the Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college.
- Good hostel facilities which are advantageous to the great concentration of rural students, especially the rural girl students in the college.
- Covid-19 pandemic impelled the college to reinvent strategies for teaching and learning.
- Covid-19 pandemic resulted in acceleration of digital transformation and opportunities for the development of new online resources and skills.

Institutional Challenge

• Large classes and an overwhelming range of student diversity and expectations.

- Diminishing number of UGC-faculty due to delayed appointments.
- Diminished teacher-student relationship and reduced engagement with students, and difficulty in comprehensive and continuous assessment of students due to large student strengths in many classes.
- Infrastructural improvement restricted due to heritage building.
- Attracting international students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The constant endeavour of Yuvaraja's College is towards excellence with social responsibility and commitment through teaching, research programmes and extension activities. The college offers graduate and postgraduate programmes combined with research in major disciplines of Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Management and Humanities with a strong emphasis on human values. All programmes in the college are designed to facilitate inclusion of as many components of science and applied science as are essential for the graduates and postgraduates to perform proficiently and competently in the technology driven society. Further, the programmes seek to bridge the gap between the academia and organizations to promote learning and research keeping in view the specific requirements of companies and industries.
- The college has adopted the Semester System with a well-planned calendar of events and Continuous Internal Evaluation System comprising regular tests, seminars, assignments, projects and a comprehensive examination all of which promote a holistic assessment of student performance.
- Sustained efforts are made to augment the teaching-learning experience by encouraging and supporting teachers to adopt innovative teaching methodologies. The faculty is also accorded opportunities to participate in the academic programmes for better exposure and constant upgradation of knowledge.
- Up-gradation of courses is a continuous endeavor at Yuvaraja's College. Several initiatives are taken up towards enhancing the quality of the programmes offered thus providing a major thrust to enhancing employability.
- For a healthy, trusting and authentic academic environment in the college, continuous performance assessment of teachers by the students is undertaken by the IQAC. An assessment of the overall performance of the college by the teachers as well as the students is also taken at regular intervals.
- Since guidance and counseling of students improve their academic performance to achieve their goals, help them deal with psychological problems, and also educate them to live in peace and harmony in the society, teacher-mentors of the college address their academic, emotional and developmental needs by collaborating with students, parents and alumni.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Teaching in the College is oriented mainly to provide students with knowledge and professional skills for obtaining jobs and for self-reliance integrated with human values. This is achieved through student-centered teaching and learning. With effective lectures, discussions, seminars and team work students are encouraged to engage themselves in participative/experiential/collaborative learning process which in turn fosters higher orders of thinking and learning in classrooms.
- The syllabus is updated as per UGC guidelines making the students competitive in moving on to

higher education, equipping them with skills required for competitive examinations and employability in emerging sectors.

- Since digital resources can be effective learning tools that support student learning process, digital learning resources like YouTube, MOOCs, podcasts, e-textbooks are introduced to the students for learning.
- Classroom learning is complemented in some departments by educational tours/field trips that help students to gain a better perspective of their subjects and also enhance their life-skills.
- Students are assessed on the basis of their performance through continuous assessment and semesterend summative assessment. Based on these evaluations, free tutorials are organized to slow learners in the college campus.
- Project-based learning is encouraged to design and develop projects and foster students' critical thinking and cross-disciplinary connections.
- Provision is made for Internships that provide students with hands on experience in the chosen field. These internships also bridge the gap between the campus and the corporate sector.
- Extra-curricular activities that provide hands on experience and contribute towards skill building in various fields are organized regularly.
- Along with the regular teaching-learning methods, the institute adopts ICT based teaching. The College encourages students to take up competitive exams like JAM, GATTB GATE, NET, UPCS. Learning through UGC resources like CPE, NPTEL, SWAYAM is also encouraged.
- Academic diary by faculty members is adopted to monitor teaching efficiency and punctuality. Academic diary is designed in consonance with UGC guidelines under the supervision of IQAC (Internal Quality Assessment Cell).
- The evaluation process is transparent and efficient with facility for grievance redressal. The examination branch is automated.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The college promotes vibrant research among faculty and students. The college has contributed considerably to the society through its academic research. It has obligatory research goals for the faculty members and adequate infrastructure for quality research. 44 of the teaching faculty are recognized research supervisors and there are currently 129 PhD research scholars working under their guidance. 64 scholars have been awarded Ph.D degrees and 977 research papers have been published in the last five years. Through excellence in research the institution has created an eco-system for innovations and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge.
- Ongoing projects are funded by reputed organizations like, UGC, DST, DBT, K Step and VGST. Many teachers have published research articles in national and international journals with high impact factor.
- The staff and students attend conferences, seminars and workshops to present their research work. Facilities required for research in the IT area is provided and centralized facilities include library with rich collections of physical and electronic subscription to journals.
- Teachers are engaged in many extension activities such as delivering invited talks, and radio programs.
- Faculties are involved in consultancy services on honorary basis. Several teachers have bagged awards for their paper publications and presentations at research conferences at various levels.
- The annual performance appraisal system encourages faculty to enhance their teaching, research and administrative skills as well as social services to the desired level of promotion.
- The institution is involved in extension activities to help society. The faculty and students participate in International Yoga Day and served as Corona warriors. The NSS and NCC Units of the college renders

social and community services. Five students have attended Republic Day Camp. Besides organizing blood donation camps, environmental awareness programmes and helping in disaster management, the college has adopted a village.

• During COVID-19 pandemic, the college formed a Covid Committee with Dr. Bhat Satish Shankar, NSS officer as co-ordinator and many students of the college as Covid warriors. They worked tirelessly with the district administration to provide relief to people during the pandemic. During the second wave lock-down period some teaching faculty and students worked as counsellors to Covid positive patients.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college is spread over an area of **6.82 acres** with 40 classrooms that include 06 smart class rooms, 22 spacious classrooms with multimedia projectors, 36 laboratories on a Wi-Fi enabled campus. The college has one Open Auditorium and a fully furnished auditorium. Zoology, Botany and Geology laboratories have museums with a unique collections of specimens.
- The college has 235 computers desktops and 57 laptops (for individual teachers). The institution has an IT policy covering Wi-Fi, cyber security with the 136 internet connections of speed 100 Mbps capacity. The college has 2 physical and 2 virtual servers, 145 LANE facility. CC TV cameras moniter activities in the college campus.
- In order to promote sports and Yoga among students, there is a well-furnished indoor auditorium and open outdoor auditorium, a cricket ground, athlete track, football field, basketball court.
- The college has full-fledged girls' hostel and boys' hostels. The college encourages the students in cultural and co-curricular activities through "Jnanavahini", the platform for extracurricular activities and "YUREKA" science fest.
- The college has a library with 197990 textbooks and 2100 journals. The library helps in e-learning and extends book loans. It is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) by providing Koha software of version 16.05 in open source. The library with 7064 e-journals and 13,817 e-books, 50 data bases also has OPAC facility to the students as well as faculties.
- The college has a Health Centre on the campus which provides free primary medical care for students and staff on an out-patient basis.. The Health centre provides care for minor illnesses and injuries also provides wellness education. The centre has a chief medical officer and a lady medical officer and X-ray, ECG, a minor OT and lab facilities are available in the centre.
- Teachers are associated with MOOC programme under SWAM scheme. Through MOOCs students have educational opportunities that are flexible, inexpensive and of best quality and which support them to compete in a technologically advanced world.

Student Support and Progression

- Yuvaraja's College strives to provide a student-friendly environment through student-centric activities and welfare schemes.
- OBC and SC/ST scholarships are provided by the Government to create social parity and also provide support to the underprivileged. The college also provides sports scholarship to students.
- The Placement cell facilitates the students' professional growth and success as many students have been placed in leading companies like INFOSYS, TCS, and WIPRO and institutes like Azim Premji University over the last five years.
- Initiatives taken up by the college for skill enhancement include communication skills, yoga, digital fluency, physical fitness and health and hygiene.

- The college facilitates vertical movement of students to higher levels and gainful employment, with several students progressing to higher education in the last five years.
- The institution has various co-curricular, cultural and sports activities to ensure holistic development of students. Students actively participate in extension activities through NCC and NSS. In the year 2018, the college NCC unit was adjudged the best NAVAL NCC Unit in Karnataka State.
- Students have won many trophies and shields in various Cultural and literary competitions held at the University, District, State and National levels. They won the overall Championship trophy at the University level Cultural and literary competitions, held at the University of Mysore, twice in the last five years in Oct. 2017 and Sept. 2019.
- An annual two-day Science Fest YUREKA is held in the college in which more than 2000 students from in and around Mysore participate.
- The college has a dynamic students' grievance redressal mechanisms that supports them while seeking redressal for grievances pertaining to sexual harassment and ragging among others.
- The college has a health centre which provides medical aid to all students. The centre has a chief medical officer and a lady medical officer and X-ray, ECG, a minor OT and lab facilities are available in the centre. Common ailments are attended to and essential medicines are provided free of cost to students. COVID vaccine was provided free of cost to students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- A transparent governance system is in place through written policies, systems and procedures, and wellcomposed committees, and accountability is ensured through consultation, evaluation and follow ups. Several institutional practices that highlight the participative management and decentralization is noticeable. The Governance of the college is effectively executed with the support of the University. Under the leadership of the Vice Chancellor as the chairman of the Governing body, the principal as the Ex Officio-Member secretary, the college focuses to be a distinguished institution of higher education.
- As an autonomous institute the college has effectively decentralized governance of all activities of college by assigning powers to the stake holders of the college. The statuary bodies of the college Governing Council, Academic Council, Board of Studies and Finance committee are accountable for the proper functioning of the academic, financial and general administrative bodies of the college.
- The executive council of the college is the Governing Council which formulates and enforces policies in maintaining the standards of the college. The Academic Council recommends new programmes of studies to the Governing Council. The new courses/course plans are designed by interacting with all the stake holders and also by exploring the opportunities available for the specific course in the industry.
- The BOS in each department is constituted as per the rules framed by the UGC and Governing Council. From the point of management of the curricular and co-curricular activities the Head of the institution in consultation with the College Council constitutes a number of sub-committees. These committees plan and implement various curricular and co-curricular activities of the college.
- From the point of governance of the departments, every department has a department council which comprises all faculty members of the department. The curricular aspects of departments are monitored by Heads of the Departments. The council also plans and implements student mentoring activities to make students conscientious citizens of the nation.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- As part of the Gender equity drive, the college ensures several measures to counsel the students and enhance safety and security on campuses by constituting the following committees: Women empowerment committee, Anti-ragging committee and Disciplinary committee.
- The institution has made efforts to reduce dependence on conventional electricity by gradually increasing the usage of natural resources such as Solar lamps and Solar panels to power the campus.
- Environmental consciousness is imbibed amongst staff and students. Separate dustbins are used to segregate degradable and non-degradable waste. Garden waste and dry leaves are composted in compost units installed in the campus.
- Students and faculty of Botany department along with NSS volunteers plant and maintain several saplings across the sprawling campus of the college.
- To promote eco-friendly transport amongst staff and students an electronic vehicle charging station has been introduced within the campus.
- The college hosts an annual Science Fest, YUREKA which is organized by the students. This is to create an increased interest in and inquisitiveness about new areas of scientific knowledge.
- The college provides health-care to its students, research scholars, teaching and non-teaching staff at its full-fledged Health-centre meeting their basic and common needs. Health-care service and essential medicines are provided free of cost. Free COVID vaccines were provided to all students, research scholars and staff during the pandemic.
- Some best practices followed by the institute are:
- Toppers in each subject are felicitated by giving cash/ medals
- Supervising, counseling and mentoring students
- Talent Search programme is organized annually in the college with more than 25 competitions
- Every year the Department of Food Science and Nutrition, in association with Nutrition Society of India, Mysore Chapter, organize a week-long activity to spread awareness regarding the measures to be taken to achieve zero hunger by 2030 and to ensure food and nutrition security to all.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The college has successfully adopted a range of methods following the guidelines of UGC/NAAC. An orientation programme is conducted for a few days to familiarize the students with the various labs/classrooms and the multiple facilities of the college. "Catch them fresh" is the idea behind organizing the Orientation Programme. The programme has a holistic approach and students are streamlined towards discipline, human values and essential health. They are also trained by the police department in appropriate behavior, traffic awareness etc. The programme also includes gender sensitization so as to inculcate in them respect towards fellow students. In addition, students are given first-aid training, fire-extinguisher use training etc. Once all these exercises are completed, the students are regularly monitored in theory as well as practical sessions. Especially, the practical sessions are slow learning and advanced learning. Students who need mentoring are identified and are assigned to a particular lecturer who acts as a mentor. The slow learners are motivated and guided to recognize the value of education. Continuous assessment in practical sessions provides us the best modes of evaluation. The advanced learners are motivated to go beyond classroom teaching. They are provided with advanced information in their line of interest, introduced to high impact factor journals and recent trends in science. This helps them accomplish higher studies and obtain national and international fellowships. The faculty supports the students to identify various all India level entrance for PG/integrated PhD. The faculty helps them prepare the project for summer internships and also act as referees and provide the confidential reports. For slow learners motivational talks/sessions are organized and they are made to interact with research/industry personnel to help them build their career in a positive manner.

Continuous assessment pattern is one area where in the students are identified and remedial classes initiated. Most of the times 30 to 45 minutes of the laboratory hour is used by the faculty to motivate as well as clear the doubts regarding the syllabus. Continuous assessment is also used as means to award IA marks which motivates the students to participate more actively in the lab and theory sessions.

Their academic performance is also improved by special counseling for the students who are interested in taking up competitive examinations. The college conducts seminars not only to access knowledge but also to equip the students with the nuances of formal presentation, body language, preparation of script, references, citation and detailed methods of collecting the information and preparing literature review prepares the students to face many future interviews in various research laboratories, private industries and other organizations.

75% of the teaching is by PowerPoint presentation and 25% by chalk and talk method. The classrooms as

well as laboratories are well set up with Projector and Computers.

Students are encouraged to participate in various symposia, quiz, poster presentations, Conferences, interinstitution competitions like All India Microbiological Society competition etc. The college draws on tests and seminars for assessing the intellectual level of students.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The College acts as an effective platform for students to develop scientific skills, knowledge, human values to build a strong character and to be model citizens. The college conducts innovative programs to stimulate the scientific ability of students and provide them a strong platform to nurture their creative skills and also supports participative learning. A Science fest with the title, YUREKA, is organized in which students exhibit their learning in the form of innovative projects. The Cultural fest platform encourages students to participate in inter-college as well as national level competitions in sports and cultural events. The institute promotes student-centric methods by enhancing the skills of students. Laboratory hours are optimally utilized for this purpose. Individual departments conduct additional practical classes for skill enhancement. The faculty promotes and supports students to join Summer Internship at various industries and reputed research organizations to get hands-on training while working in the company.

Problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experience. Especially, Bioinformatics tools are extensively used in many life science departments to provide updated knowledge in Biology. (NCBI, GenBank, EMBL, DDBJ, BLAST, EMBOSS, RasMol, PROSPECT, COPIA, FASTA, Swiss-Prot, Clustal W-MSA, Unigene, Ensembl, PubMed, Entrez, PubChem, PERL, BIOPERL, SRA, Glimmer and ORF Finder). This way the programme essentially aims to be a solid stepping stone for a career either in academia or in industries. Syllabi and course structures deal with basics of bioinformatics and programming concepts and focus on introductory courses on cell and molecular biology, evolution (MEGA

and PAUP), Chemistry, Mathematics and Statistics (DBMS, SQL, BLOSUM, PAM). The course curriculum deals with critically advanced areas of bioinformatics and each of these subjects individually has the capacity to lead the students toward their excellence in academic or industrial research and product development.

The specific interest of every student is further nourished through the final dissertation semester in the student's selected area of research, either under the supervision of in-house faculty members or in high-quality research labs in India or abroad, thereby preparing the student for the world in multiple fields.

Project development in PG courses is based on latest science topics where students showcase their intelligence and creativity. Industrial visits are frequently engaged by various departments for in-person experiential learning. They are also combined with visiting highly reputed organizations from all over the country. Certification Courses such as MOOCs are developed and students are encouraged to build up their expertise by participation in such courses. This further enhances the experience of acquiring skill for building a vibrant career. Students are made to participate in activities such as seminar, group discussion, poster presentations, projects, and skill-based workshops and seminars. The participation of students in sports is not only in inter collegiate events but also in Inter-university competitions.

Students are encouraged to apply for all India level exams and fellowships for which the faculty provides support starting from application presentation to providing confidential reports to National and International level institutes.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process.

Response:

The College believes that inculcation of knowledge is best achieved with ICT tools along with traditional teaching style, as the younger generation is adapted to modern gadgets and therefore the process of fixing ideas is best achieved via ICT. Our faculty merge technology with traditional mode of instruction to teach students. ICT is advantageous to both teachers and students and therefore College uses Information and Communication. The faculty uses ICT enabled classrooms with LCD projectors, Wi-Fi connectivity, software, PowerPoint presentations developed by our own teachers lead to advanced knowledge and practical learning. Few labs and Class rooms are upgraded with new projectors and computers. NCBI tools are being extensively used in many life science departments to provide the latest knowledge in Biology. NCBI tools like EMBL, DDBJ, BLAST, EMBOSS, RasMol, PROSPECT, COPIA,FASTA, Swiss-Prot, Clustal W-MSA, Unigene, Ensembl, PubMed, Entrez, PubChem, PERL, BIOPERL, SRA, Glimmer and ORF Finder are available for teaching. Other software like Python, Matlab, Microsoft Office, the newer version of word file and Excel utility files have been inculcated. Overall the faculty are using ICT in teaching on day today basis to enhance the quality of education. There are 32 projectors in different

classrooms/labs. More than 200 desktops have been provided to faculty and many of the departments have printers with copiers.

The faculty have laptops (numbering more than 57) provided by the College exclusively for ICT usage. Photocopier machines - Multifunction printers are available in the college. There are photocopy machines, scanners in several departments. 3 Seminar halls are equipped with advanced interactive tools. The Auditorium of the college is digitally equipped with mike, projector, 2 cameras and computer system which can be used for online presentations. Further, online classes whenever required are being held via Google Meet, Zoom, Google Classroom and Google Duo.

National digital library, a facility released for the students from IIT Khargpur with over 4 crore and 60 lakh books is accessible to students. The faculty of the College are involved in developing e-contents and e-resources via MOOC platform.

More than 300 faculty use Power Point presentations. Class rooms have Wi-Fi connectivity for online search engines and websites to prepare effective presentations. This facility has enabled the faculty to use live search engines to display various research contents in order to directly show to the students in the class room.

Few departments have an Industry Connect online live sessions where in successful alumni of the college are made available to the students to motivate them. The College has organized many online Seminars and Conferences where lectures and experts from various sectors of Science establishments are made available for the student's interaction.Video lecture have been organized where recorded videos and lectures are made accessible to students for long term learning and future referencing which is especially helpful during examinations.

2.3.4 Preparation and adherence of Academic Calendar and Teaching plans by the institution

Response:

The college follows the academic calendar as per UGC and University of Mysore guidelines. The university suggested a common academic calendar in its jurisdictions so that uniformity is maintained by all colleges to end the academic calendar on a specified month of the academic year which helps the students of many colleges in the state to apply and get admission to Post graduate courses in and out of state.

Academic calendar is prepared in advance that is before the commencement of the academic year. The college adapts the Academic calendar with the information regarding the teaching learning schedule working days, holidays, semester examination and also the commencement of next academic session. These schedules are well-planned and followed. The students' academic progress is monitored regularly by adopting the strategy of continuous evaluation, seminars, project work, internal test and final examinations.

The college frames the syllabi as per UGC regulations and the same is thoroughly discussed in the Board of Studies which is held in all the departments of the college. Once the syllabus is approved the same is kept for authorization in the Academic council of the College. Once approved the same is sent back to the departments. Each department conducts council meeting and allots the syllabus as lesson plan along with the total time duration in which it should completed. The other important point is conduction of internal assessments and seminars. The internal assessment dates are decided and informed in advance and on the scheduled dates the same is conducted. Further, seminars and written assignments are also collected in the stipulated time frame. Some departments also organize invited talks and seminars. The invited talks and seminars are designed mainly on syllabus topics. For the enhancement of knowledge the talks and seminars are not pre-decided but are conducted by looking into various factors like unprecedented holidays, work load etc.

Therefore, the college mandates all Departments to prioritize activities which lead to academic research and fulfill its vision and mission. The college recognizes that a research-oriented faculty that is committed to generate ideas and knowledge can enhance the teaching and learning process. The college provides all necessary infrastructural facilities and a conducive environment to promote research activity on the campus.

This committee also monitors the impact of research and consultancy and ensures that research and consultancy ethics are adhered to, guidelines related to professional ethics, the privacy of the people, human rights, problems to health and safety of human beings, and damage to property are meticulously followed.

All Ph.D students register with the University of Mysore and the research guides are recognized by the University of Mysore. Many projects are funded by reputed organizations like, UGC, DST, DBT, KStep and VGST. Many teachers have published text books and research articles in reputed national and international journals with high impact factor. The faculty and students are encouraged to attend conferences, seminars and workshops to present their research work and findings. Facilities required for research in the IT area is provided and centralized facilities include library with a rich collection of physical and electronic subscription to journals, abundant bandwidth and internet facilities. The faculty is encouraged to pursue part-time Ph. D programmes. A good number of students have registered for Ph.D programmes. The institution has created an eco-system for innovations and other initiatives for production and transfer of knowledge. Also the teachers of some departments are involved in consultancy services on honorary basis and few teachers have patents to their credit. Several teachers have bagged awards for their paper publications and presentations in research conferences at various levels. Response:

The college has created an appropriate ecosystem for research and innovation by engaging and developing desirable human resource, taking initiative for creation and propagation of knowledge and establishing state of the art infrastructure.

The college provides a congenial environment for innovation and transfer of knowledge. Essential facilities are provided and guidance is extended to the students to actively involve themselves in pertinent research for societal needs. Required support is offered for documentation, publication of research papers. Besides, to create awareness the college convenes workshops, seminars and guest lectures on entrepreneurship. Students are furnished information about opportunities to directly interrelate with outstanding entrepreneurs excelling in their field. Product service training is bestowed for creating awareness on marketing the products and to produce successful entrepreneurs imbibed with leadership qualities using innovative and ethical business practices to make global impact.

Excellent research infrastructure has been created, both through extramural sources such as DST, UGC, DBT, VGST etc., and through intramural funding. Dynamic and vibrant young faculty along with renowned distinguished experts at senior level to mentor and channelize the young students and scientists are serving in the college. The faculty members constantly up-grade themselves by attending various conference, seminars and lectures. Faculty members are granted leave and provided financial support to attend academic activities outside the University, in India and abroad. To facilitate networking and to establish multi-disciplinary and interdisciplinary research collaborations, the institute invites renowned scholars for lectures and discussions. Some of the departments have also signed MoUs with other institutions. Various departments have collaborative research programme with IISc., GKVK, Bangalore, CFTRI, DFRL, JSS College, Mysore and Sahayadri College, Shivamoga. In addition, faculties have collaborative research programmes with institutes across the country.

Further, the college has adopted/initiated several innovative teaching/research programmes in interdisciplinary, cross-disciplinary areas having societal impact so as to bridge the gap between the boundaries of physical sciences, life sciences, and social sciences. Several research outcomes of the innovative ideas by the faculties of the University are patented. Regular women empowerment and women entrepreneurship programmes are organized to upgrade the socio-economic condition of the women folks. For sensitization of entrepreneurship, community orientation, programmes like rural library services, community skill development, farmers' awareness, health and education are also organized. Efforts to create awareness to revive the traditional folk culture is also taken on mission-oriented mode.

The NSS wing of the college undertakes community orientation programmes to improve the physical and mental health of villagers. Various competitions like volleyball and football tournaments are conducted among different villages. Several social awareness programmes like yoga, meditation and camps, health camps are also organized in nearby schools. Interaction with students is also carried out to help them build up their sports activities. For these purposes cultural and athletic meets are organized frequently.

- The college promotes vibrant research among faculty and students. The college has contributed considerably to the society through its academic research. It has obligatory research goals for the faculty members and adequate infrastructure for quality research. 36 of the teaching faculty are recognized research supervisors and there are currently 130 PhD research scholars working under their guidance. Through excellence in research the institution has created an eco-system for innovations and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge.
- The NSS and NCC wings of the college are involved community development activities like Swachhata Abhiyan, free Eye Check-up Camps, Blood donation Camps, Corona Warriors during COVID-19, conducting RTPCR testing and COVID Vaccination camps in the College Health Centre, holding jathas on issues of social concern, conducting Environment awareness programmes etc.
- Through the NSS wing schools have been adopted and free stationery have been distributed to the needy students.
- The Women Empowerment Committee of the college, is involved in creating awareness about Gender equality and sensitizing the students towards the same.
- Many Health Awareness programmes have been held in other institutions by the Food Science and Nutrition department of the College.
- Faculties are involved in consultancy services on honorary basis and some have Patents to their credit. Several teachers have bagged awards for their paper publications and presentations at research conferences at various levels.
- Besides organizing blood donation camps, environmental awareness programmes and helping in disaster management, the college has adopted a village.
- During COVID-19 pandemic, the college formed a Covid Committee with Dr. Bhat Satish Shankar, NSS officer as co-ordinator and many students of the college as Covid warriors. They worked tirelessly with the district administration to provide relief to people during the pandemic. During the second wave lock-down period some teaching faculty and students worked as counselors to Covid positive patients.
- ASPIC (Antibiotic Stewardship and Prevention of Infection in Communities) club, Yuvaraja's College Chapter is established during Pandemic on 5th August 2020 and has conducted many online programs, competitions for awareness and currently is doing offline programs also.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

- Response: Located in the heart of the heritage city of Mysore and well-connected by road and rail transport the Yuvaraja's College provides quality education and ensures the all round development of the students by fostering awareness, responsibility and empowerment.
- The institution has user-friendly infrastructural facilities which are beneficial to teaching, learning and for the comprehensive development of students. The college coordinates both UG and PG programmes with research programme in many subjects.
- The college has student-friendly infrastructural facilities for good instruction and also to promote an effective learning environment. It has four buildings – Old Block, Applied Science Block, Centenary Block and RUSA building and a total of 39 spacious and well-ventilated classrooms that include 05 smart class rooms and 22 classrooms with multimedia projectors.
- Four additional class rooms are under construction. Being a science college, there are 36 wellequipped laboratories with specific subject related instruments to give hands-on experience to the undergraduate and postgraduate students and for research purpose as well. All the laboratories are designed as per the needs of the subjects and to make learning effective. Each laboratory has a separate preparation room.
- The bio-hazardous wastes generated in laboratories are sent to Mysore city Corporation for further processing and disposal. The Zoology, Botany and Geology laboratories have fine and rare collections of specimens.
- The college has 345 computers desktops, laptops for individual teachers and related accessories. In the departments and laboratories of Computer Science, Physics, Statistics Mathematics, Geology and Molecular Biology computers have required software and are designed with inclined monitors for effective use. Darkroom facility is available in the Physics laboratory for certain specific experiments. The Computer Laboratories are air-conditioned.
- The college has 2 physical and 2 virtual servers and 145 LANE facility.
- With a sprawling campus to manage, CCTV cameras are installed at strategic points for real-time monitoring of the activities happening around the campus and also to monitor the students and take necessary action when required. The College is also provided with sufficient number of cameras for the computers, headphones with mikes that help in online teaching when required.
- The college has one well-furnished indoor auditorium and one open outdoor auditorium, library, playground, indoor sports facilities, girls' hostel, boys' hostels and adequate rest rooms for boys and girls.

Response:

- Yuvaraja's College encourages multifarious co-curricular activities among the students. The college has ample facilities for the participation of students in both indoor and outdoor games as well as in co-curricular activities.
- There is a well-equipped multipurpose Indoor Hall that is used to carry out various activities such as daily training sessions in Yoga, Kick boxing and karate, table tennis and badminton. The indoor hall is also used to provide special fitness training for the students of the College. About 50 students undergo training every day in these facilities.
- Around 100 students regularly practice yoga which includes different asanas, pranayama, meditation etc. On an average, 50 students practise Kick boxing and Karate regularly.
- The college also has an advanced Gym center to increase the strength, power, speed and additional stamina of the students. The Gym center has a leg press machine, seated curl machine, barbells, dumbbells, abdominal station, chest bench press, pull up machine, Castle bell skipping etc. Students on a regular basis participate in Kick boxing and Karate at National and international levels.
- The college has outdoor game facilities which include a Cricket ground, Athletic track, Football field and Basket ball court. The college has one Synder Athletic track and two Matting Cricket pitches. Students regularly practice Hockey, Volleyball, and Khokho among other games. The College also has one Hockey fields, one Volleyball courts of size 18 m \times 9 m (Each court), two KhoKho fields of dimensions 36 m \times 18 m, one Kabbadi courts measuring 13 m \times 10 m and one Football fields measuring 105 m \times 65 m. On an average, 50 students are involved in regular practice every day.
- College has three Basket ball courts, four Tennis courts, one Ball Badminton court and one Throwball court. Yuvaraja's College students take daily training sessions in their respective sports. By making use of these facilities students represent the college and the university in all India level sports and competitions.
- The college also has a Standard Swimming pool and an average of 30 students practice regularly.
- The College has two auditoria one open JayachamarajendraWodeyar auditorium and another wellfurnished, acoustic-enabled Platinum Jubilee Hall for conducting all cultural activities for the students. Every year in the beginning of the academic year the College has organizes talent search programme to identify the best in 22 different cultural events. The selected candidates represent Yuvarajs's College in inter-university and intra-university as well as Zonal level competitions.
- Our college students are well-versed in singing (classical, Bhavageetha, and folk songs), dancing (Bhrathanatyam and folk dance) and drama. All the cultural programmes are organized under the aegis of the college cultural committee, Jnanavahini. Yuvaraja's College also organizes YUREKA,

a Science fest annually.

• This science fest has science related competitions including science quiz, treasure hunt, debate and essay competitions etc. Different students from various colleges participate to put to test their talents. The selected students are considered as best YUREKA performers.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Response:

Response: The college library as an organized set of resources, is an indispensable support system and an integral part of the teaching-learning mechanism enhancing the cause of both education and academic research. The library is innovative in its use of new information technologies thus combining technology and information resources to provide teaching resources, unhampered access to information and referral services. It also extends services by providing assistance of library staff for navigating unlimited information with a variety of digital tools.

- The College has a spacious Library and Information Centre housed on the first floor of the building with an area of 1100 sq.m. It has a separate reading room with an area of 2000 sq.m. It is a repository of a collection of 1,98,909 books. The college library is equipped with 04 Computers with Wi-Fi and LAN enabled with 100 Mbps for a fast and seamless access to the Internet and E-Resources for the benefit of their academic and research work. The books have been completely barcoded and computerized. To encourage and engage students, the college has upgraded the library facility in the campus.
- The Library automation started in the year 2010 with Koha Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS) of version 3.12.04.000. Koha is the world's best open source library automation software, with a range of features including Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) module which is a digital database for e-books, journals etc and it provides a simple and clear interface for library users to search for, reserve and suggest new items. OPAC helps students to search for books easily, it can be linked to full text and also displays complete bibliographic information. It can be accessed anytime, anywhere by students and staff members.
- The functionality of Koha open source ILMS for all the housekeeping module has been customized by organizing brainstorming interactive sessions with experts and Library Professional staff. Currently version 16.05.03.000 is in use in the college library. The ILMS provides a distributed system of input for bibliographic details of the books, reference materials, Braille books, Audio CD collection etc.
- The software supports to input bibliographical details of regional language collections like Kannada, Hindi, Sanskrit and Urdu resources by its original scripts. The system provides cataloguing and complete stock details of the books, reference books, CD, DVD's, Maps, Video Cassettes, Journals, Periodicals and other non-book material available in our library. Separate computers are provided to the library users for searching the books on Online Public Access

Catalogue (OPAC) in the library.

 Number of users, both teachers and students, using library through e-access and physical access is prepared to find out usage statistics of faculty and students. The college library has also adapted bar coding system that helps label books, magazines, CD and DVDs. Barcode technology has proved to be most successful due to its speed, accuracy and reliability.

Response: One of the key success factors in teaching and learning process is the availability of robust IT infrastructure. The purpose of IT in the college is to make the IT infrastructure available to all the stake holders of the college and guarantee adequate control in the college campus.

- IT facilities are upgraded periodically with additional computers, printers, scanners and LCD projectors. The old Reprographic and Biometric Attendance devices have been replaced with the advanced one. The College has 315 Computers, 57 Laptops, and 17 Projectors in classrooms, laboratories and seminar halls.
- The college has 04 buildings Heritage building, Applied Science Block, Centenary building and RUSA building and all these buildings are connected via Local Area Network.
- The college campus is Wi-Fi enabled with internet connection speed of 100 Mbps. The digital library facility is made available in Yuvaraja's College library building. All the faculty members use official email address for all communications. In the exam section secure Database is used for Exam Purposes Question Paper Bank Database is encrypted.
- The College upgrades ICT enabled infrastructure periodically by procuring suitable software for the enhancement of teaching-learning and networking capabilities. IT facility is extended to the students in Online application portal, Online fee payment, Online mark statement and Online

provisional results. For the purpose of transparency and security surveillance CCTV cameras, biometric are installed. IT facility is mainly adopting in administration and academics tasks. The software supports both marks based and credit based regulations.

Software infrastructure in the Departments:

- Statistics Department uses software STATCRAFT and R software.
- Mathematics department uses FOSS (Free open source software) tools such as Mercina, Scilab to teach mathematical concepts in the practical component.
- Geology department uses free downloadable software Surfer and MAPInfo.
- Computer Science department uses free downloadable software such as Pytho, Eclipse, Java, DEB, MS Office, Automation Lynex etc., to teach Computer science for B.Sc., and BCA students.
- MBA department uses the software Eviews for data analysis and SPSS-16 for BBA and MBA students.
- Examination process of College has outsourcing with software companies i.e. Attris Technologies Private Ltd., LOGISYS.
- Library is used JAWS software for Visually challenged students through Drushtiprogramme .
- The Licensed Kasperskey Antivirus software is used for system administration. The office staff useNudi v4.0 software for academic purpose in local language. The emphasis is more on the use of free open source software. With the use of digital technology all official work especially, salary related matters are carried out through online treasury using HRMS. In order to protect devices from viruses that can destroy the data, slow down or crash devices, antivirus protection is provided to all computers. They are renewed before the expiry date.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response: Physical facilities: The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources collected from Partially Self-Financing Scheme (PSFS), funds collected from the students at the time of admission and other resources like CPE and Autonomy grants as well as lab grants from research students for the maintenance and upkeep of different facilities.

- In each semester in the College Council meetings (includes HODs of all department of the college) convened under the leadership of the Principal of the college, allocates budgets to different departments as per their specific requirements for the maintenance of the departments, laboratories and the classrooms and for the teaching and learning processes.
- Prior to this, meetings are held at the department levels and suggestions are sought under the leadership of the Heads of the Departments and the requirements for the academic year are listed out. Requirements of all the departments are placed before the college council and budget is allocated in accordance with their requirements. Yuvaraja's college has various committees to execute the curricular and extra-curricular activities of the institution.
- Regular meetings of these committees are conducted for the purpose of utilizing Physical, academic support facilities and also for the optimal utilization of the grants received by the college.
- The PSFS grants are utilized for the maintenance of the department, laboratories and the classrooms.
- The college has one girls' hostel and two boys' hostels. The maintenance and hygiene in and around hostels is sustained by group D employees under the supervision of wardens who are faculty members deputed from the college.
- The maintenance and the cleaning of the classrooms, laboratories and the rest of the areas of the college is carried out by the D group employees.
- The college has a sprawling garden area with an assortment of plants and trees which is maintained by the gardeners appointed by the college. The students, faculty, and the NSS wing of the college are actively involved in the Swacch Bharat Abhiyaan programme to keep the college Campus clean and green throughout the year.
- Computers: The college has an adequate number of the computers with internet connections required for the departments, college office staff and computer labs. Software is uploaded as per requirement to the computers used in the office. Lab-technicians are appointed to look after these facilities. All the computers are provided with Wi-Fi network and are maintained and serviced by the Information and Communication Division (ICD).
- The college has established a sports complex that includes a gymnasium and facility for indoor games. The college has a well-equipped multipurpose Indoor Hall that is used for daily training sessions such as Yoga, kick boxing and Karate, table tennis and badminton. The College maintains full-fledged playgrounds for football, cricket, hockey, basketball, volleyball, tennis among other

sports.

- Classrooms: Since Yuvaraja's College is a Science college, practical classes are conducted in the laboratories. Based on the lab requirement as per the syllabii, classroom furniture and other facilities, the heads of the departments submit their requirements to the Principal. The college allocates funds for procurement, maintenance and minor repair of furniture and other electrical equipment. Regular budget is allocated for this purpose.
- The college preserves and maintains rare specimens in the three museums in the departments of Zoology, Botany and Geology. Sports complex: The Physical Instructor appointed by the college, takes care of the facilities and sports support. Students are trained to participate at the university level, state level and national level events and outstanding students are recognized and extended financial support in term of scholarships, travel expenses, track suits etc.
- The College cultural committee, Jnanavahini takes care of all co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Students are encouraged to participate in university level, state, national and international level events. The outstanding students are identified and financial support is extended to participate in different events. The college website is maintained regularly.
- The college has a separate undergraduate library that takes care of all the requirements of the students in academics. The library facilitates borrowing of books, extends book loans, provides e-learning, e-journal and e-books facilities as and when required.
- The college canteen is situated within the college campus with service available between 8 am and 6 pm. The food and beverages are served at subsidized rates as per the policy of the college. The maintenance and activity of the canteen is governed by the canteen committee constituted by the college.
- The college has separate maintenance contracts for security services, campus lighting, solar power and house-keeping. The college has ample number of separate rest rooms and wash rooms for boys and girls. Newly constructed toilets have railing systems for the physically disabled. Funds received under different schemes and from various agencies are spent strictly as per the norms of the University and Government of Karnataka.

5.3.2 Presence of an active Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution

- Yuvaraja's College has been consistently striving to create and provide a student friendly environment to the students through many student-centric activities and welfare schemes. The college provides sports scholarship to students who excel in sports and also there are **OBC and SC/ST scholarship** provided by the Government which aim at creating social parity and support to the underprivileged. The college has active students' **grievance redressal mechanisms** that help them seek redressal for complaints, including those about sexual harassment and ragging.
- As the number of students seeking admission to undergraduate education has increased over the last five years, there have also been a significant number of students graduating from Yuvaraja's college and pursuing higher education in India and abroad. The college facilitates vertical movement of students to higher levels and gainful employment, with an average of **50% students progressing to higher education** in the last five years. The **Placement cell** facilitates the students' professional growth and success as many students of YCM have been placed in leading corporates like INFOSYS, TCS, WIPRO etc., over the last five years.
- The institution has various co-curricular, cultural and sports activities to ensure the holistic development of the students. Students actively participate in extension activities through NCC and NSS. In the year 2018, our college NCC unit was adjudged the best NAVAL NCC Unit in Karnataka State. Our students have excelled in various categories of sports events and have represented the College in particular and the University in general at the District level, South-Zone level and at the National level competitions and have brought laurels to the college.
- Students of YCM actively participate in Cultural and literary competitions and have won many

trophies and shields in various competitions held at the University, District, State and National Levels and have made our college proud. Infact, our students have won the overall Championship trophy at the University level Cultural and literary competitions, held at the University of Mysore, Mysuru, twice in the last five years in Oct 2017 and Sept 2019.

• Every year, during the even semester, an annual two-day Science Fest YUREKA is held in the college which is entirely planned and executed by the students, showcasing their organisational capability. Started in the year 2013, YUREKA has grown in leaps and bounds and has gained immense popularity amongst the student fraternity. More than 2000 students from in and around Mysore participate in various competitions mainly from the field of Science. Prior to this two-day event, to promote YUREKA, a cricket tournament YUREKA Cup and a Marathon are held which draw huge number of students from different colleges. Also during every YUREKA, a cultural evening is held with great enthusiasm. Last year in YUREKA 2K22, a record of nearly 8000 people witnessed the Cultural Programme 'Yuvakalarava' at the open-air theatre in Manasagangotri Campus, University of Mysore. Never before in the history of Yuvaraja's college, a cultural programme of this magnitude was organised. This was the first of its kind.

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the Institution

Response:

Nature of Governance: Multi-layered transparent governance system is ensured through written policies, systems and procedures, distinct job descriptions and well-knit committees, and accountability is ensured through consultation, evaluation and follow ups. The Governance of the college is effectively functioning with the support of the University. Under the able leadership of the Vice Chancellor as the chairman of the Governing body, the principal as the Ex Officio-Member secretary, the college focuses to be a distinguished premier institution of higher education. The governance is agile and open to changes happening in the industry. Under the skilful governance of the governing body, the college has several under graduate and post graduate programs.

Participation of Teachers in Decision-Making Bodies: Teachers contribute to the institutional policy making by being the representatives of the Governing Council, IQAC and various committees of the college. College council consists of all the heads of the department who actively participate in the various decisions of the college. The Academic Council consisting of Heads of the departments of various disciplines and external members from industry and academia focuses on the enrichment of the curriculum and other academic matters every year. The curriculum is developed after obtaining feedback from the stake holders based on the industry needs under the competent leadership of the principal. The college thrives as a centre for intellectual advancement of students, providing new courses, research opportunities, placements, extracurricular activities, sports for all round development of the students. Performance of students are monitored by teachers and in case of disciplinary actions initiated against students, the principal in consultation with disciplinary committee decides the further course of action.

The College has taken a leap forward by implementing 'New Education Policy' (NEP), introducing new subjects and combinations at the P.G and U.G levels, expansion of research by increasing the Ph.D programs for several courses, ICT facilities, supportive tools for better teaching, collaboration with industries and research institutions for internships and project work.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

The institutional Strategic/ Perspective plan has been clearly articulated and implemented.

The Strategic Plan for the Period 2017-22:

- Providing visionary goals of the college looking at the trends in academic disciplines

The plan has been revised to meet the challenges of the Pandemic and to incorporate major policy changes proposed by National Education Policy 2020. In view of the pandemic, new goals related to health and wellness, promotion, academic and professional integrity and innovation in course assignments were included in the action plan.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation:

The Library has good collection of books, reference section, periodicals section, text book section and book bank section. The College has Local Area Network [LAN], structured cabling and broadband having 1 Gbps speed. The college has 9 e-classrooms with equipped modern ICT tools. The college has 40 classrooms, 32 laboratories, 3 Museums with rare specimens, gymnasium etc. The Health Centre in the campus is well equipped and provides necessary medical-aid to the staff and students. CCTV surveillance is provided and the laboratories are updated.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration:

The college takes constructive efforts for collaboration with various agencies for academic, extension, research, placement activities. Collaborations help the Departments to organize seminars, exhibitions, internships, placement and various extension activities

Curriculum Development:

The College is offering research oriented, inter-disciplinary; value based innovative programmes at graduate and post-graduate levels. The syllabus is reviewed and / or revised every three/two years. The college follows the guidelines for curriculum development and restructuring set down by the UGC and the parent university. 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes visible in terms of – Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality (in case of first cycle) Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality and post accreditation quality initiatives (second and subsequent cycles)

Response:

The peer team which assessed and accredited Yuvaraja's College in the year 2015 made the following recommendations. The following are the measures initiated by the college to implement them.

The appointments are made by the parent University and the college has no administrative powers to make any appointments.

More systematic efforts are done to develop specialized research in advanced areas. Faculty make periodic visits to research institutes for expertise support. Vijnana Bhavan, a central instrumentation facility of the University of Mysore houses IOE which provides specialized instruments to carry on research in advanced areas.

The college has collaborations with MOUs with six organizations. College has carried out more than 750 collaborative research activities during the 4th cycle period.

The BOS of most science departments and the Academic Council of the college has industry representatives. Many departments have collaborations with the industry. Research institutes like CFTRI, IITs and IISc, CCMB, IIAP are periodically consulted.

Students attend workshops and take up project work in some of these institutes.

The teaching faculty is free to carry out PhD research work anywhere. Yet most of the UGC faculty are doctorate degree holders and research supervisors.

The college has a pro-active Placement Cell which is constantly involved in boosting and giving a direction to the capabilities and competencies of the students. The college works in association with the University Career Hub which focuses on career building and also on increasing the employability skills of students.

The department of Botany provides consultancy service in plant identification. Department of Statistics provides consultancy to research on data analysis. Department of Geology provides consultancy on evaluation of water quality for assessment. Food Science and Nutrition department provides consultancy on Diet and Nutrition, Nutritional assessment and food adulteration and detecting techniques.

Students are encouraged to regularly participate in inter-college, inter-university sports and also at national levels. The college has a well-equipped Gym to encourage physical activity. There is a Yoga hall where Yoga is taught.

Talent Search Programmes are conducted every year to tap the best talent in co-curricular and cultural activities. They participate in inter-college and inter-university competitions. *Yureka*, a fest is organized by the students. *Jnanavahini* is a platform for the cultural activities.

NSS unit of the college carries out many extension activities. During Covid lockdown, students played crucial roles as Covid Warriors.

Earn while you learn scheme was initiated during the academic year 2014-15 to support the deserving students financially. Subsequently due to administrative issues and Covid lockdown the scheme had to be suspended. The scheme will be introduced again. Effective mentoring by faculty helps students to show academic progress.

Coaching classes are initiated and soft skill development courses are offered to the students in association with University Career Hub, Mysuru. The focus is on UPSC, KPSC and other competitive examinations.

The program was initiated from 5th November 2022 under the name 'Yashaswi Sparda Payana mathu Kalike Jothe Kaushalya (Journey towards Succeeding in Competitive Exams and Skill Development with Learning)'.

Evaluation of teachers by students:

The institution has a feedback system to evaluate the teachers by students. The regular evaluation of the teachers by the students, feedback on teaching methodologies, course delivery, attitude, strengths and weaknesses, difficulties faced in the subject give a clear idea about the problems faced by the students. The Principal and University officials also monitor the feedback system and takes appropriate corrective actions.

Student learning outcomes:

The institute monitors the performance of the students regularly. It has specified procedure to collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes; the following points are adopted by the institute in this context:

Student Mentoring by Faculty Members:

The objective of the student mentoring system is to provide support for the academic performance and psycho-social development of students. Every student has a mentor, to provide support to the students in matters of academic, non-academic and personal difficulties. The mentee will be assigned to the same mentor until the completion of the programme for effective tracking of progression. The mentor maintains a record of the mentoring sessions with the mentee. The mentoring record includes the academic progress, extra-curricular activities and student achievements. The mentor offers support and guidance on academic development, career progression and personal counselling which enables, the holistic development of

students. Thus, through mentoring system a mentor establishes a better understanding of the mentees and propels them towards pursuing their aspirations to achieve greater heights. The mentor identifies students who are in need of personal counselling and guides them to the institutional counsellor for counselling sessions. The mentees can meet their mentors and seek advice at any time during the regular working hours or over phone.

Response:

Gender Equity

Yuvaraja's College contributes to gender equality in many ways by not only providing the women students increased access and inclusion in Higher education but also by tracking their progress, outcomes and success rates. The norms of gender equality are framed and practised by the college through many ways especially, by integrating gender perspectives in teaching and research. The college endeavours to significantly reduce gender imbalances at the academic level through its various policies and services that support women's progress and empowerment. The college also makes consistent efforts to provide equal opportunity to all individuals irrespective of gender, race, caste, colour, language, religion, political leanings, property, birth or any other status. Issues of prime concern are safety, security and well-being of every student. Students are educated to refrain from discriminatory and prejudicial treatment and harassment of girl students.

Gender equality initiatives are taken both at the departmental and college levels as is evident by the facilities provided.

The teachers strive to create an inclusive and healthy classroom environment while being acutely sensitive to the gender dynamics in the classroom. All students irrespective of gender are encouraged to voice their views and are provided feedback and support.

Safety and Security

Security checkpoints are provided at all campus entries and exits. Security guards are deployed at the main gate and students with valid identity cards are allowed entry into the campus. Wearing uniform is made mandatory. Strict implementation of Anti-Ragging measures and keeping the campus ragging free is given priority.

The college campus is under surveillance with CC cameras installed at prominent locations.

Women faculty members accompany girl students when they participate in outdoor activities or tours. The college also ensures security through the Disciplinary committee.

Well-trained and vigilant women warden and assistant wardens are appointed to the Girls' Hostel in the campus.

A complaint box is arranged to receive grievances or suggestions from the students which are redressed/ addressed by respective committees. Emergency contact numbers are displayed in prominent places in the campus.

Counseling:

The faculty counsels the students during mentoring regarding academic performance, career plans and personal issues.

Gender perspectives are integrated into teaching and research to overcome gender imbalances.

Faculty Placement Cells and Alumni Placement Assistance Cell extend support in educating the girl students regarding career plans and entrepreneurship policies.

Common Rooms and other facilities:

A separate spacious well-ventilated ladies' room/common room with attached wash room facilities is provided for girl students in a secure place located next to principal office.

Girl students have access to sanitary napkins in the college for a nominal price.

The staff and students have access to first-aid and basic treatment at the health centre which is in the campus in the event of medical emergency. Emergency fund is made available in case of accidental incidents encountered in laboratories or in the college campus.

Thus in spite of the fact that the college has a heterogeneous crowd, effective measures are taken to incorporate a gender-neutral approach among the staff and students.

• Solid waste management

Dry waste like paper, leaf, plastic wastes (bottles, food package covers, single use plastic covers) collected separately from each department is dumped in common dustbin and handed over to the corporation. Separate dustbins for overall paper waste, plastics to be kept in the campus to recycle it and use again. Institution has 2 incinerators to burn the Sanitary Pads a biological Hazardous Waste generated by the college female students and female staffs.

• Liquid waste management

Harmful chemical waste generated from practical laboratories is diluted before disposing into sink. Sewage water generation is reduced by controlled water flow using pressure reducing valves and also by creating awareness among the students and faculties by easily visible posters and boards with message to "save water", "close tap properly".

• Biomedical waste management

Sanitary napkins, cotton swabs are incinerated in incinerator. Microbiological samples and culture media generated from biological lab are autoclaved and disposed in labeled specific polythene bags and then handed over to MCC.

• E- waste management

E-Waste generated from discarded electrical and electronic equipments even after reuse and repair along with used tube lights and CFL are given to the regular scrap dealer for proper disposal. Sewage water is drained to corporation UGD system. Lead waste generated by dead batteries is returned for money to the seller in a buy back option.

• Waste Recycling System

All one-side used papers are utilized for routine printing activities.

Old papers shall be used for making paper bags to sell to roadside vendors.

NSS Day is observed on 24th September wherein various events are organized at college. Cleaning of the college campus by students is one of the activities.

On October 2nd the college celebrates birth anniversary of Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, the father nation. NSS unit organizes programs such as planting of saplings, patriotic singing competitions, seminars, Swacchta Abhiyaan.

In the reporting year,

October 30th. The college library observes Gandhi Jayanthi by arranging book exhibition every year.

On January 12th National Youth Day/ week is celebrated to mark the birth anniversary of youth icon Swami Vivekananda and different types of programs are arranged to celebrate the youth week. Book exhibition is arranged by the Library to enhance the interest towards spirituality.

Best practice 1

1. Title of the Practice:

Antibiotic Stewardship and Prevention of Infection in Communities (ASPIC) Club, YCM Chapter: A community service-oriented club at Yuvaraja's College, Mysore

2. Objectives of the Practice:

- To build this club as a forum for science outreach and public engagement.
- To provide students an opportunity to volunteer, explore and learn in the areas of science communication and public engagement.
- To be a part of a global network of stakeholders working on antibiotic stewardship and infection prevention.

3. The Context:

Sustainability of Anti-biotic resistance mitigation efforts is possible through sensitized student networks. To promote youth engagement in these efforts, Antibiotic Stewardship and Prevention of Infection in Communities (ASPIC) Clubs Network was conceived. The objective is to initiate a public cause and create social consciousness among people on anti-microbial resistance and its impact on human life through varied ways.

The students of the Department of Molecular Biology, Yuvaraja's College took the initiative to start the Antibiotic Stewardship and Prevention of Infection in Communities (ASPIC) Club, Yuvaraja's College Chapter. The club was inaugurated on 5th August 2020 under the guidance of Prof. N.S. Devaki, the Course Coordinator of the Department of Molecular Biology. Seeded by ReAct, Asia Pacific, the club involves students to work for one of the most pressing public health concerns and mitigate the threat of anti-microbial resistance in communities. The primary idea is that when students involve themselves in working against anti-biotic resistance, there can be more vibrant research and better community

awareness. The main objective of the club is to have activities at the college and community levels.

The misinformation being spread during COVID19 and noticing about ASPIC Clubs Network on twitter provoked a group of enthusiastic master's students who planned and set the outline for this. From then platform is promoting awareness in various aspects of antibiotic resistance & its impact on global health, pathogens, infections and its control. The idea of ASPIC Clubs Network is to promote a public cause and create social awareness among community on anti-microbial resistance through different modes. The club's activities are coordinated by ReAct Asia Pacific is headquartered at the Christian Medical College, Vellore, Tamil Nadu (https://www.aspic.in/react-asia-pacific) which is a division of the ReAct Network (https://www.reactgroup.org/) stationed at the University of Uppsala, Sweden.

4. The Practice

Since the club was inaugurated during COVID19 pandemic, most of the activities went online. Major objective of the club is to create awareness among general public about antibiotics & antibiotic resistance infections its control & prevention. For this we started by involving students of non-Life Sciences streams to make them aware of ill impact of antibiotic resistance on global health and how we can contribute to reduce its burden. Our future target includes programs to sensitise about antimicrobial resistance and one health concept among school children (since they are the future generation of the society), farmers, medical practioners and general public. Club is getting ready with a street play on Anti-Microbial Resistance (AMR) and Infection control and shortly it is going to be played for public awareness.

Uniqueness: active presence in all social media, creation of awareness materials (social media posts and videos) in regional language – *Kannada* to create wider audience and reach out to public effectively.

- Antimicrobial Awareness Week: One webinar & Interaction with IISER Tirupati students about their iGEM project related to antibiotic residues in environment
- Video podcasts on COVID19 related AMR issues and infections
- Video podcast discussing with IISER Kolkata students about their iGEM 2021 project pertaining to diagnosis of bovine bacterial infection
- Translation and voice over to a video from English to Kannada explaining AMR and about safe consumption of antibiotics entitled "Superheroes against Superbugs team"
- Displayed drawings/comics related to AMR and conducted an awareness quiz program entitled ESKAPE in our college during college annual science and culture fest YUREKA2022.

.6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The funding in the form of seed grant we receive from network is minimum for some of the wider activities in our future goals like public outreach of local government schools, communities involved/concerned with antibiotic resistance: medical practioners, pharmacists, farmers and general public. Also, the less awareness about science communication and public engagement among science students and teachers is a major hindrance to involve wide set of volunteers with active participation. This can be overcome by building connections/interaction sessions with professional and passionate science communicators.

7. Notes (Optional)

There is a requirement for establishing this type of club in other educational institutes too. We already have had a global pandemic of COVID 19 from 2020 to date resulting in the death of more than 68.7 lakh people globally. AMR can cause more deaths if this is not abated and hence serious measures to contain this must be made at global level. This can be done "think locally and act globally". Thus, Yuvaraja's College (Autonomous) has established Antibiotic Stewardship and Prevention of Infection in Communities (ASPIC) Club, YCM Chapter: A community service-oriented club at Yuvaraja's College, Mysore.

Best practice 2

1. Title of the Practice: 'Akshaya Pathre' – Free Mid-day Meal

Programme for needy students

1. Objectives of the Practice:

- To provide mid-day meal to the students (day scholars) coming from far away places
- To increase the nutrition level of economically backward students by providing them with a nutritional meal
- Encouraging students to attend classes regularly

1. The Context

Yuvaraja's College as a centre of higher education provides high quality academic programmes to students from diverse sections of the society at affordable cost. Among the students who enroll in the college there are hundreds of them coming from villages and taluks of adjoining districts of Chamarajanagar, Mandya, Hassan. A greater part of the students admitted to the college are from socially and economically weaker sections of the society. The college provides hostel facilities to a large section of students, yet the huge and ever-increasing strength of the college makes providing hostel facility a challenge. To meet the needs of

the economically weak students and to provide them sustenance during the working days, the mid-day meal programme was launched by the college.

The scheme of providing mid-day meal to the economically underprivileged students from rural and distant places has been taken by the college on a priority basis during the past many years. At present the scheme had about 250 beneficiaries. The objective of the scheme is to create an ecosystem of empathy and support for the needy students by providing them nutritious meals which would sustain them through the day and help them involve themselves in academic activities robustly. It would also foster a sense of equality and deter the students from feeling inferior to the economically sound students.

4. The Practice

Economically weaker sections of students who do not stay in the hostels, but come from rural areas and distant places are covered under this scheme. It had been implemented successfully because of financial support by donors from both within and outside the college and also teachers and alumni of the college.

It is very gratifying that the college is one of the very few colleges to launch and keep this programme going in spite of the various challenges it faces. It is indeed a one of its kind practice at the centres of higher education. The limitations the college experiences are the inadequate funds at its disposal which deters the college from meeting the needs of more students who are eligible for coverage under this scheme. Hence the college is constrained to extend this support to students for a limited period during the year.

Apart from donors, some students who have passed out from the college too generously support this endeavour of the college. Akshaya Patra Foundation, Mysuru too has joined hands with the college in its endeavour to eliminate class-room hunger by providing nutritious food to 190 socio-economically backward students.

About 200 students applied, among these based on the distance they travel and economic condition 190 students were selected. Identity cards were issued to the selected students. ISKCON Mysuru was contacted. They agreed to provide food for each student at the cost of Rs. 25/ day. The money collected by the donors was used for the purpose. Some of the teachers sponsored one day meal by donating Rs. 5000/. Rs. 95,000 was collected from the Alumni of our college was used for this purpose.

One of the rationales behind this programme, apart from keeping the students from hunger during their stay in the college and providing them nutritional support, is also to ensures reduction in dropout rate among students. The initiative, if it could be extended to more students would be a notable step towards the realization of the right to food. The college endeavours to retain the effectiveness and relevance of this initiative of providing wholesome meals along with effective education which inturn would brighten the future of thousands of students.

5. Evidence of Success

- Students were served nutritious meals which included rice, sambar, palya, special rice, vegetable khootu, sundal, payasam and pickle under the inspection of teachers. The feed back from students and incharage teachers who tasted the food expressed satisfaction about the quantity, quality also meticulously prosecuted plan both by the college and ISKCON.
- Feed back from the students also revealed that many students used to skip lunch and used to attend

afternoon classes as they had to start early from home.

• The programme positively influenced attendance

6. Problems Encountered and Resources RequiredMDMS remains to be one of the crucial welfare schemes of the government. However, insufficient funds continue to be a challenge. With a limited fund, providing quality food to a large group of students has become a diffcult task. The prices of daily consumables are increasing day by day and it is dif?cult to manage quality ingredients on a low budget. The programme is being carried out only for a limited period due to fund crunch.

Students Centric Teaching and Learning:

Yuvaraja's College is rich in history. It is one of Karnataka's oldest colleges and a leading academic centre. Yuvaraja's College stands apart for its high academic standards and what is worthy of attention is that it carters to a large section of students from the marginalized sections of the society. The college with its broad range of undergraduate and master degree programmes and doctoral programmes places its major educational emphasis on undergraduate instruction of superior quality. The college has a faculty with advanced teaching and research capabilities, enhanced laboratory facilities and substantial library resources. Research is perceived as an integral part of the learning and teaching experience. A wide variety of services like health care, career placement and counselling are provided to students. The college is the first to attain autonomous status (2005) in this region. Autonomy has allowed the college to stay at the forefront of educational innovation.

A college is its people – its students, faculty, staff and **alumni**. The college has produced students who have gone on to achieve great success in different fields. The alumni of our college are gold medallists in various Postgratuate Departments of Studies in science of the University of Mysore. Every year our students join prestigious institutions for higher studies in and outside the country. Their achievements serve as a testament to the quality of education that is offered at Yuvaraja's College and inspire current students to strive for excellence in their own chosen fields.

The college has a clear-cut focus on research and innovation, the faculty are recognized Research

Supervisors of the University of Mysore while some are pursuing research with fellowship. The faculty have published **research** papers in top-tier, peer-reviewed journals. Our faculty have obtained prizes in **poster/paper** presentations.

Karnataka being the first state to implement National Education Policy, some of the faculty members are serving in **state level committees**. The faculty members are serving as members in Board of Studies and Board of Examinations in other colleges and universities across Karnataka, sharing their expertise and promoting quality education. Teachers from our college are deputed to the University under various capacities.

Yuvaraja's College regularly organizes **conferences**, webinars, and seminars which provide opportunities for students and faculty to learn from experts in their fields and stay up-to-date with the latest developments.

The college is also a thriving cultural and sporting hub that provides students with a wealth of opportunities to grow and develop in many different areas. Students regularly represent the university, state, and the nation at various events. The students are organizing an intercollegiate cricket tournament. The college encourages its students to participate in **cultural activities**, which helps to build their confidence, creativity, and leadership skills. Yuvaraja's college hosts **YUREKA**, an intercollege science fest, which provides students with opportunity to showcase their scientific skills and knowledge, and to learn from their peers from other colleges. This event attracts participants from all over the state.

The college has active NSS and NCC wings. Some of our students have represented the state in the Republic Day parade. The college is also dedicated to making a positive impact on the society at large through extension work. It has adopted a village, Naguvinahalli and is working to improve the lives of people in these communities.

The college encourages students to explore their literary talents through the publication of **Magazine** *Yuvachinthana*, an annual magazine that showcases the writing and creative work of students and faculty members. The students of Yuvaraja's College have launched a newsletter named *Yuvachiguru*. This publication provides a platform for students to share their thoughts and experiences, and it helps to foster a sense of belonging among the students. The college has launched an online magazine, *Chinthana Manthana*, where students and faculty members can share articles on the contributions of Indian scientists. This provides a platform for students to express their ideas and showcase their knowledge, and it also helps to promote a passion for science and technology among students.

The college has ladies and boys hostels **facilities**. For the benefit of day-scholars traveling from distant places and economically weak students, the college provides midday-meal with the support of donors.

The college has a health centre on campus that provides comprehensive health care free of cost to the students and staff. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the health center provided free vaccines to students and staff, demonstrating the college's commitment to ensure the health and safety of its community.

Yuvaraja's college constitutes various **committees** for the carrying out administration and related functionalities, addresse issues related to the stake holders and for overall progress of the institution. In association with University Career Hub, Career and Placement Guidance Committee conducts coaching classes for students who aspire to take UPSC, KPSC and other competitive exams.

Yuvaraja's College maintains a rich **biodiversity** on its campus and has documented various species of plants, birds and butterflies. The Green Audit committee, *Yuvabotanica* and Zoology Forum regularly organize programmes. Measures are taken to reduce pollution through proper waste disposal and environmental awareness initiatives. The campus has been declared a 'No Smoking Area' and the use of less-polluting vehicles, bicycles and electric vehicles are encouraged. Provision is made for EV charging-point.

Yuvaraja's college values not just academic excellence, but also the importance of engaging with the wider community and making a positive impact. The faculty members are making a positive impact in the society through various **extended** activities such as writing articles in local newspapers, participating in tree walks, bird watches, and butterfly walks as resource persons; working to create awareness about conservation and environmental protection. (Ananya Vasudev, is a Disaster Management Professional and a geologist involved in emergency operations with NDRF and the Armed Forces during natural calamities) Some of the alumni with appreciable research output are now faculty in country's top research institutes, including Indian Institute of Science. (Prof. Ganesh Nagaraj, Department of Biochemistry, IISc and Dr. Nikhil Gandsi, Assistant Professor, Department of Molecular Reproduction, Development and Genetics, IISc).

Some teachers are selected for responsible positions in the University administration. The Director, College Development Council, Director, SC/ST Cell, Special Officer, PhD Section and the Estate Officer of the University are faculty of our college.

Annually, during the internationally acclaimed Mysore Dussera, our students' participation in *Yuvajanotsava* wins public acclaim.

Concluding Remarks :

Yuvaraja's College is a Constituent Autonomous College of the University of Mysore that provides quality education in a variety of fields to students from diverse walks of life, especially, the marginalized sections of the society from the rural areas. The institution's performance spans across three areas: teaching, research and knowledge transfer through extension activities. The students are provided with mentoring and networking opportunities with skilled coaching and guidance. It is a CPE and RUSA funded college.

The college with its affordable tuition fees is consistently ranked among the highly preferred educational institutions that provides students with a platform to specialize in an array of courses across science disciplines and management studies that empowers students carve a bright future for themselves and also to act for the betterment of the society. It strives to advance marginalized and under-represented students and in particular

endeavours to empower rural girl students and eliminate the barriers and challenges they face. The college introduced NEP 2020 from 2021-22. The curriculum is consistently restructured to add newer and enhanced changes to impart students with incremental life skills which are imperative for progression in the modern society.

Recognizing the importance of a culture of research, the college addresses the challenges of creating a productive research environment. Undergraduate and postgraduate students are exposed to research practices early in their courses and encouraged to develop their research skills. The promising students are provided personalized research guidance by some motivated faculty members and made aware of the research opportunities in their chosen areas of study.

The college has 44 PhD guides among the teaching faculty providing guidance to 129 scholars who are currently working for PhD degrees. 64 scholars have been awarded PhD degrees in various disciplines in the past five years. The total research paper publications from the college in the last five years is 913.

The NCC and NSS units of the college are among the best in the state of Karnataka. Our cadets participate in the Republic Day parade.
